- The Failures & Complications of Early Child Welfare: Examining the systems in place at the time and their human cost. Have you ever witnessed someone fall through the cracks of a system meant to help them?
- Poverty, Morality, and Survival: The choices made under extreme duress. Can you
 remember a moment when fear, pressure, or heartbreak forced you to act before you
 were ready?
- Transformation & Resilience: How individuals and families adapt and change through hardship. Have you ever looked back and realized that the hardest season also revealed your greatest strength?

Discussion Questions

- 1. Estella's journey begins with profound abandonment. How does this inciting incident shape her character and decisions throughout the novel? How would this make you feel placed in these circumstances?
- 2. The novel vividly contrasts early 20th-century Philadelphia with Lancaster Amish Country. How do these two settings influence the characters' lives and choices? What details stood out to you in each?
- 3. The separation of Estella from her children, and of the children from each other, is central to the plot. Discuss the emotional impact of these separations on Estella, Frances, John, and Florence.
- 4. Florence is raised in an Amish family, a culture starkly different from her birth family's. How do you think this upbringing affected her sense of identity? What challenges do you anticipate (or observe) in her eventual reunion with Estella?
- 5. Estella's decision to work in banking was highly unconventional for a woman of her time. How does this pursuit of independence contribute to her character arc? What obstacles did she face, and how did she overcome them?

- 6. The novel touches on the early child welfare system. What were your thoughts on how it operated and its consequences for families like Estella's? How has our understanding of child welfare evolved since this period?
- 7. The book is described as a "poignant tribute to maternal strength." In what ways does Estella embody this strength? Were there moments where you questioned her choices, and why?
- 8. Consider the role of supporting characters like Frances, John, and Estella's allies (Stephen, Ruth, the Murphys, etc.). How do they contribute to Estella's journey and the overall narrative?
- 9. "The Philadelphia Matriarch" is inspired by true events. How does knowing this impact your reading experience? What aspects felt particularly authentic or moving?
- 10. The novel explores themes of memory, love, and identity during long separations. How do these themes play out for Estella and Florence, particularly in their reunion?
- 11. The early 20th century was a time of significant social change (WWI, suffrage, Prohibition). How do these historical events serve as a backdrop or directly influence the characters' lives?
- 12. If you could ask Estella one question after finishing the book, what would it be?
